NIH Summer Training Institute for Randomized Clinical Trials Involving Behavioral Interventions

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Dr. Abeles is a Special Assistant to the Director of the Office of Behavioral and Social Sciences Research in the Office of the Director at the National Institutes of Health. From 1994 to September 1998, he served as the Associate Director for Behavioral and Social Research at the National Institute on Aging (BSR/NIA). Previously he served at BSR/NIA as the Deputy Associate Director from 1980 to 1991 and Acting Associate Director from 1991 to 1994. In 1993 he received the National Institutes of Health Award of Merit for "leadership and contributions to the advancement of behavioral and social research on aging." His 1971 Doctoral degree in Social Psychology (with a minor in sociology) is from the Department of Social Relations, Harvard University. His experience as a Staff Associate at the Social Science Research Council from 1974 to 1978 for the Committee on Work and Personality in the Middle Years, and the Committee on Life Course Development, stimulated his interest in life course issues. He has organized several symposia at the annual meetings of professional societies, published chapters, and edited books on various aspects of life-course and aging research, most frequently in regard to the sense of control and to the interface between social structure and behavior. He is the editor of *Life-span Perspectives and Social Psychology* (Erlbaum & Associates, 1987), co-editor of *Aging, Health, and Behavior* (Sage Publications, 1993) and of *Aging and Quality of Life* (Springer Publishing Company, 1994), and is an associate editor of the *Handbook of the Psychology of Aging*, Fourth and Fifth Editions (Van Nostrand Reinhold, 1996 and 2001).

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Dr. Brody is the Leon Jaworski Professor of Biomedical Ethics and Director of the Center for Medical Ethics and Health Policy at Baylor College of Medicine. He is also a Professor of Philosophy at Rice University and Director of the Ethics Program at the Methodist Hospital. Dr. Brody received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Brooklyn College in 1962 and his Doctoral degree from Princeton University in 1967. He studied at Oxford University as a Fulbright Fellow from 1965 to 1966. He taught at M.I.T. from 1967 to 1975, and has been at Rice since 1975 and at Baylor College of Medicine since 1982. Dr. Brody is the author and editor of 24 volumes and 120 articles and chapters. His major scholarly works are *Abortion and the Sanctity of Human Life* (M.I.T.: 1975), *Identity and Essence* (Princeton University Press: 1981), *Life and Death Decision Making* (Oxford: 1988), *Ethical Issues in Drug Testing, Approval and Pricing* (Oxford: 1994), and *The Ethics of Biomedical Research: An International Perspective* (Oxford: 1998). He is currently working on a new book on intellectual property in biotechnology. Dr. Brody has received four grants from the Office of Technology Assessment of the U.S. Congress to do studies on the ethics of the following: new reproductive technology; the patenting of transgenic animals; genetic testing in the workplace; and patenting human gene fragments. Dr. Brody has served on five data safety and monitoring boards for the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute and currently serves on the Data and Safety Monitoring Board for the AIDS Clinical Trials Group. Dr. Brody is the Principal Investigator of the "Protecting Scientific Integrity Through Disclosure of Conflicts of Interest" study (funded by NASA) and of the "Ethical Issues in Emergency Research" study (funded by the NIH). He is a Co-Investigator in two additional studies, "Enhancing the Autonomy of Vulnerable Subjects of Research" (funded by the NIH) and "Patient Preferences in End-Stage Prostate Cancer" (funded by the VA). He has helped 11 healthcare institutions organize their ethics committees. He serves on the editorial board and board of directors of the *Journal of Medicine and Philosophy*, and on the editorial board of *Social Philosophy and Policy*. Finally, Dr. Brody has served on the national board of the American Philosophical Association, has headed the NASA Bioethics Policy Task Force, and is a past president of the Society for Health and Human Values. He is a Fellow of the Hastings Center and was elected in 2001 to the Institute of Medicine.

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Dr. Davidson is Assistant Professor of Medicine and Clinical Intervention Research Director of the Integrative and Behavioral Cardiology Program at the Zena and Michael Wiener Cardiovascular Institute of the Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York. Dr. Davidson's research focuses on the interplay between personality, emotions, and physical indices of health in adults. Cardiovascular diseases comprise the area of physical health that she typically studies, and she is interested in personality assessment and intervention at the primary, secondary, and tertiary stages of these diseases. She has conducted randomized controlled trials primarily in anger management, but has recently developed an interest in depression reduction and subsequent improvement in cardiovascular parameters such as uncontrolled hypertension and silent ischemia. Of note are her two randomized controlled trials demonstrating that anger expression changes, gained from group therapy, decrease hostility as well as blood pressure and hospital re-admissions. Dr. Davidson is the Chair of the Society of Behavioral Medicine Committee on Evidence-based Behavioral Medicine, a task force charged with improving and implementing evidence-based principles for behavioral medicine researchers, practitioners, and students. She has taught evidence-based psychotherapy theory and practicum courses to clinical psychology graduate students for a number of years at both the University of Alabama and Dalhousie University. She is an editorial board member of *Psychosomatic Medicine* and the *Journal of Research in Personality*.

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Dr. Frasure-Smith received a Doctoral degree in Social Relations from the Johns Hopkins University and completed an NIMH Post-Doctoral Fellowship in Psychology at McGill University. She is currently an Associate Professor of Psychiatry at McGill University, Senior Research Associate at the Montreal Heart Institute, Adjunct Associate Professor of Nursing at McGill University, Associate Member of the Department of Biostatistics and Epidemiology at McGill, Professeur Associé in Psychiatry at the University of Montreal, and Associate Researcher at the Research Center of the Centre Hospitalier de l'Université de Montréal. She is a Fellow of the Society of Behavioral Medicine, a member of the American Psychosomatic Society, the Academy of Behavioral Medicine Research, and the Society for Clinical Trials. Dr. Frasure-Smith, and her colleague Dr. François Lespérance at the Montreal Heart Institute, are known internationally for their work bringing depression to the forefront of research in behavioral cardiology. They are examining the importance of depression and other psychological and social factors in the development and prognosis of cardiovascular disease, studying the physiological and behavioral links between depression and cardiovascular disease, and developing and evaluating interventions to change the impact of the depression and other psychological factors in cardiac patients. They carried out the Montreal Heart Attack Readjustment Trial (M-HART), a randomized trial of a one-year program of monthly monitoring of psychological distress coupled with home nursing visits for highly distressed patients recovering from myocardial infarctions. M-HART, jointly funded by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute and the Canadian National Health and Development Program, included 1,376 post-MI patients and was one of the first large psychosocial intervention trials. Drs. Frasure-Smith and Lespérance recently received funding from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research to carry out a multisite, randomized trial of Interpersonal Psychotherapy and Citalopram in patients with stable coronary artery disease. Recent publications have appeared in the *Archives of Internal Medicine*, *Lancet*, *Circulation*, *Psychosomatic Medicine*, *Health Psychology*, and the *Journal of Psychosomatic Research*.

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Ms. Miller is the Associate Director of the Stanford Cardiac Rehabilitation Program and adjunct clinical assistant professor at the University of California San Francisco School of Nursing. Over the past 25 years, she has been project director and Co-Principal Investigator on numerous cardiovascular research studies, including the recent multicenter Enhancing Recovery in Coronary Heart Disease study of psychosocial recovery in the post-M.I. patients. Ms. Miller attended the University of Washington School of Nursing, where she received her Bachelor of Science degree. She is a past Chairman of the Board of the California Affiliate of the American Heart Association and serves on the National Board of Directors of the American Heart Association. She is a co-founder of the Preventive Cardiovascular Nurses Association, a national organization dedicated to training and expanding the role of nurses in cardiovascular risk reduction. Since 1995 she has represented the American Nurses Association on the National High Blood Pressure Education Program Coordinating Committee at the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute. In 2000 Ms. Miller received the American Heart Association's Award of Meritorious Achievement for her research in secondary prevention and the Award of Excellence from the American Association of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation for her contributions to the field of cardiopulmonary rehabilitation. She is one of the developers of the MULTIFIT program, a nurse case-management system for cardiovascular risk reduction and chronic diseases such as heart failure. The author of over 100 publications, including both articles and book chapters in the areas of exercise training, smoking cessation, lipid management, hypertension, compliance, and the psychological recovery of post-myocardial infarction patients, she has also co-authored a book entitled *Lifestyle Management for Patients with Coronary Heart Disease*.

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Dr. Kaplan is Professor and Chair of the Department of Family and Preventive Medicine at the University of California, San Diego. He is a past president of several organizations, including the American Psychological Association Division of Health Psychology, Section J of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (Pacific), the International Society for Quality of Life Research, and the Society for Behavioral Medicine. He is currently chair of the Behavioral Science Council of the American Thoracic Society and president-elect of the Academy of Behavioral Medicine Research. Dr. Kaplan is the Editor-in-Chief of the *Annals of Behavioral Medicine*, Associate Editor of the *American Psychologist*, and Consulting Editor of four other academic journals. Selected additional honors include the following: the APA Division of Health Psychology Annual Award for Outstanding Scientific Contribution (for Junior Scholar 1987 and again for Senior Scholar 2001); Distinguished Research Lecturer in 1988; Health Net Distinguished Lecturer in 1991; University of California 125th Anniversary Award for Most Distinguished Alumnus, University of California, Riverside; American Psychological Association Distinguished Lecturer; and the Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award from the American Association of Medical School Psychologists. His public service contributions include participation in various grant review groups for some of the National Institutes of Health, the Agency for Healthcare, Research and Quality, and the Veterans Administration, service on the local American Lung Association's Board of Directors, and on the regional research committee for the American Heart Association. He has served as co-chair of the Behavioral Committee for the NIH Women's Health Initiative, and as a member of both the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute's (NHLBI) Behavioral Medicine Task Force and the Institute of Medicine National Academy of Sciences Committee on Health and Behavior. In addition, he is the chair of the Cost/Effectiveness Committee for the NHLBI National Emphysema Treatment Trial. Dr. Kaplan is the author or co-author of more than a dozen books and more than 340 articles or chapters.

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Dr. Kaufmann is Leader of the Behavioral Medicine Research Group at the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI), NIH. He received his Doctoral degree in Psychology in the Biopsychology program at the University of Chicago, and did postdoctoral research in Neurosciences at Duke University, where he investigated cellular excitability of the central nervous system under conditions of environmental stress. After coming to the NHLBI, he applied his knowledge of the neurosciences and psychology to develop studies of the role of stress in coronary heart disease and hypertension. Data from one of these studies, the Psychophysiological Investigation of Myocardial Ischemia, provided evidence for mental stress as an independent risk factor for mortality of patients with confirmed coronary artery disease. Dr. Kaufmann was also instrumental in conducting several multicenter randomized clinical trials involving behavioral interventions, including the Hypertension Intervention Pooling Project, Trials of Hypertension Prevention, the Raynaud's Treatment Study, and Enhancing Recovery in Coronary Heart Disease patients. Dr. Kaufmann has published and presented papers at various national meetings on cardiovascular psychophysiology and on clinical research in behavioral medicine. Dr. Kaufmann has promoted evidence-based behavioral medicine and the importance of rigorous application of randomized clinical trial methodology for evaluating the effectiveness of behavioral interventions for mental disorders and behavioral risk factors for somatic illnesses.

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Dr. Keefe is a Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and Associate Director for Research in the Duke Pain and Palliative Care Initiative at Duke University Medical Center. In addition, he is a Professor of Psychology: Social and Health Sciences at Duke University. He received his undergraduate degree in psychology at Bowdoin College (B.A., 1971) and his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology at Ohio University (Ph.D., 1975). Following graduate school he completed a Post-Doctoral fellowship in the Psychophysiology Lab at Massachusetts Mental Health Center at Harvard Medical School, where he conducted research on clinical applications of EMG biofeedback. Dr. Keefe has broad interests in behavioral and psychological aspects of pain and pain management. He is recognized for his research on pain coping and his controlled treatment outcome studies evaluating the efficacy of coping skills training interventions for persons suffering from persistent disease-related pain. Dr. Keefe has played a key role in the development of clinical pain services and pain research programs at Duke Medical Center. For 20 years he directed the Pain Management Program and was a leader in the development of Duke Medical Center's multidisciplinary pain programs (both out-patient and in-patient). He has developed and refined a number of treatment protocols for persistent pain including spouse- and partner-assisted pain coping skills training interventions. After spending a year-and-a-half on the faculty of his alma mater (Ohio University), Dr. Keefe returned to Duke in the Fall of 1999 to take a position as Associate Director for Research in Duke's new Pain and Palliative Care Program. He is currently an Associate Editor for the *Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology*. He also serves as Secretary of the American Pain Society and Psychology Section Editor for the journal *Pain*. Dr. Keefe is a fellow of the Division of Health Psychology and of the Society of Behavioral Medicine. He has been active in the Society of Behavioral Medicine and the International Association for the Study of Pain. He has published over 140 papers, 42 book chapters, and three books on topics ranging from pain during mammography to the assessment of cancer pain. In recognition of his clinical research, Dr. Keefe was recently awarded the Wilbert Fordyce Clinical Investigator Award at the American Pain Society. He has served on numerous NIH Study Sections including the Behavioral Medicine Study Section and is frequently asked to consult with NIH program staff and other government programs (e.g., Department of Labor). Dr. Keefe recently completed his terms as an Associate Editor for *Health Psychology*. He has frequently served as a member of the Division 38 Scientific Program as a reviewer.

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Dr. Powell is a Professor of Preventive Medicine and Psychology and the Director of the Division of Population Sciences and the Section of Epidemiology in Preventive Medicine. She is a licensed clinical psychologist and a psychosocial and cardiovascular epidemiologist with expertise in anger/hostility, social support, spirituality, depression, ovarian function, and alcohol consumption — and their relationship to cardiovascular disease, particularly in women. Dr. Powell received her graduate training in psychology at Stanford University and her post-graduate training in epidemiology and biostatistics at Mt. Zion Hospital of the University of California at San Francisco. She has expertise in clinical trial methodology and was formerly the Principal Investigator of the Chicago site of the Enhancing Recovery in Coronary Heart Disease program, a multicenter randomized behavioral clinical trial aimed at treating depression and low social support in patients with new myocardial infarction. She is currently the Principal Investigator of HART, a randomized behavioral clinical trial aimed at teaching self-management skills to patients with heart failure. She also has expertise in observational epidemiology and is currently the Principal Investigator of a longitudinal, population-based study of psychosocial and cardiovascular changes that occur as women undergo the menopausal transition. Dr. Powell is a Co-Principal Investigator of the Chicago site of the Women's Health Initiative, where she sits on the Behavioral Advisory Committee that guides all behavioral aspects of the clinical trials and the observational study including strategies to improve adherence and retention. She is the Principal Investigator of the Chicago site of two clinical trials that are exploring the impact of hormone therapy on cognition in post-menopausal woman.

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Dr. Proschan received a Doctorate in Statistics from Florida State University in 1989, a Master of Science in Statistics from Stanford University in 1982, and a Bachelor of Science in Statistics and Mathematics from Florida State University in 1980. Since 1989, Dr. Proschan has been a Mathematical Statistician at the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute. He has worked on several clinical trials that used behavioral or non-pharmacologic interventions such as diets and lifestyle changes. His role in these trials has been to help with design (sample size/power, whether to pair-match, whether to use a parallel-arm or crossover trial, etc.) and analysis issues (what kind of model to use, handling missing data, etc.). Dr. Proschan is also involved in smaller clinical trials and other kinds of studies, such as measuring agreement between real-time 3D echocardiography and angiography with respect to whether segments of the heart are diseased. His responsibilities also include methodological research; he has a special interest in research on adaptively modifying sample size in clinical trials. He taught statistics and mathematics courses at Palm Beach Junior College, Tallahassee Community College, Florida State University, and Stanford University. More recently, Dr. Proschan taught a course called Methodology in Clinical Trials for the Foundation for the Advancement of Education in the Sciences. Before becoming involved in biostatistics, Dr. Proschan was an engineering statistician at Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, which makes engines for commercial and military airplanes. He conducted risk analyses, modeled failure times, and worked on tolerance problems, among other duties.

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Dr. Schooler is the Director of Psychiatry Research at the Hillside Hospital Division of the North Shore Long Island Jewish (NSLIJ) Health System. She received her Doctoral degree from Columbia University in social psychology in 1969. She held a number of positions in the Extramural Programs of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), where she not only administered grant programs and grant review, but also designed, directed, and coordinated multicenter clinical trials of both medication and psychosocial treatments for schizophrenia. She left the NIMH to become Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. She has continued to focus her research on both schizophrenia and multicenter trials at the University of Pittsburgh and more recently at Hillside Hospital, where she is the Associate Director of an NIMH-supported Intervention Research Center for Schizophrenia. Her contributions to clinical trial methodology include instrument development for assessment of adverse effects, social adjustment and psychopathology. She has edited books and written about controlled clinical trials in clinical psychology and psychiatry. She has also been an active participant in the ongoing developments designed to enhance protection of potentially vulnerable populations who participate in research. Dr. Schooler is actively developing methods to assess patient understanding of research participation.

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Dr. Wittes, President of Statistics Collaborative, Inc., received her Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics from Radcliffe College in 1964 and her Doctoral degree from the Department of Statistics at Harvard University in 1970. She is a Fellow of the American Statistical Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and an elected member of the International Statistical Institute. From 1994 to 1998, she was Editor-in-Chief of *Controlled Clinical Trials*, the official journal of the Society for Clinical Trials. Dr. Wittes is a member of many advisory committees, including a large number of data and safety monitoring boards for randomized clinical trials sponsored by both industry and government. Her previous positions include those of Biostatistician, Department of Veterans Affairs Cooperative Studies Program, West Haven, Connecticut from 1989 to 1990; Chief, Biostatistics Research Branch, National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute from 1983 to 1989; and Associate Professor, Department of Mathematical Sciences, Hunter College of the City University of New York from 1974 to 1982. Her research has focused on the design and analysis of randomized clinical trials, capture-recapture methods in epidemiology, sample-size recalculation problems in clinical studies, and the incorporation of subjective endpoints in clinical trials.

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Dr. Willis is a professor of human development at The Pennsylvania State University. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Texas at Austin. Dr. Willis' research, funded by the National Institute on Aging for over 25 years, focuses particularly on developing and evaluating training programs to help other adults compensate for age-related declines. She also looks at practical intelligence — how people solve everyday problems, such as understanding the instructions on prescription labels. Dr. Willis serves as consulting editor for *Gerontology Review*, *Cognition and Aging*, *Journals of Gerontology: Psychological Sciences* and as a reviewer for several other journals. She is a co-author, with K. Warner Schaie, of the textbook *Adult Development and Aging*, now in its fifth edition, plus is the author/co-author of numerous journal articles and chapters related to cognitive training in the elderly. She was president of Division 20 (from 1993 to 1994) and holds Fellow status in two divisions of the American Psychological Association and Fellow status in the Gerontological Society of America. She was honored by The Pennsylvania State University's College of Health and Human Development in 1992 with the Pattishall Distinguished Research Award, in 1999 by The Pennsylvania State University with a Faculty Scholar Medal for Outstanding Achievement, and in 2001 Dr. Willis was honored with The Pennsylvania State University's College of Health and Human Development Pauline Schmitt Russell Distinguished Research Career Award.

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


